The year continues on a strong note for cancer researchers across the Faculty. As we venture into the second half of 2019, there have been numerous events, publications, awareness days, training sessions and seminars to celebrate.

News & Events

- Congratulations to Dr Katie Smith, Wellcome Trust Fellow and Honorary Research Associate at the Institute of Infectious Disease and Molecular Medicine who was recently awarded a grant from the Poliomyelitis Research Foundation (PRF) for her work entitled "Regulation of HPV infection and cervical cancer progression following helminth infection." This work builds on a 2018 publication in Scientific Reports, demonstrating that exposure to hookworm parasites can decrease HPV uptake and cervical cancer cell migration by altering EMT marker expression (doi: 10.1038/s41598-018-30058-9). The newly funded project will be led by MSc student Claire Butters.
- The Cancer and Primary Care Research International Network (Ca-PRI) conference was held at the University of Toronto in May. The conference theme highlighted "Cancer Inequities at Home and Abroad in the Age of Migration: Roles for Primary Care." Dr Deborah Constant presented work on exploring the feasibility of using mobile phones to improve the management of clients with cervical cancer precursor lesions, while Prof Jennifer Moodley presented on the development and validation of the African Women Awareness of CANcer (AWACAN) Tool. The next Ca-PRI meeting will be held in Oxford, UK, in April 2020.







- The Institute of Infectious Disease & Molecular Medicine (IDM) held a special seminar in April entitled "Advances in KSHV-associated Malignancies." The talk was hosted by Dr Georgia Schafer and main presentation given by Dr Thomas Uldrick, Deputy Program Head of the Global Oncology Program at the Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Centre in Seattle, Washington. Dr Uldrick is a global expert on KSHV-associated malignancies.
- News from the South African Medical Research Council's (SAMRC) Gynaecological Cancer Research Centre (GCRC):
 - Findings from the GCRC study on holistic sexuality post gynaecological cancer treatment will be presented by Sorrel Pitcher at the Psychology Society of SA Congress in September and Dr Nazia Fakie at the SA Congress of Oncology Conference in August.
 - In July, Sorrel Pitcher will be attending the summer school at the University of Amsterdam titled 'Sexuality, Culture and Society'. Safe travels, Sorrel!
- News from the **Division of Otorhinolaryngology**:
- ➤ 14th UCT Karl Storz Fellow in Advanced Head and Neck Surgery from Ethiopia commenced 12 months' training in April 2019
- African Head and Neck Society (AfHNS) Clinical Practice Guidelines for Head and Neck Cancer in Developing Countries and Limited Resource Settings now has guidelines for thyroid, parotid and submandibular gland tumours. - ➤ 3rd African Head and Neck Society Meeting held in Harare, Zimbabwe, in May: Training council formed to establish AfHNS fellowships in 4 Sub-Saharan African countries to be run by past UCT Karl Storz Head and Neck Fellows. This ensures sustainability of head and neck surgical training in Africa and accelerates the provision of head and neck cancer services.
