- The role of a CAB (Community Advisory Board) is to represent the community in clinical research.
- CAB's are a requirement in terms of: -
 - Good Clinical Practice (GCP)
 - Good Participatory Practice (GPP) of the UN
- The CAB members relay information about clinical trials to their communities.
- The CAB advises research organisations on enrolling participants.
- Clinical Research organisations give feedback on studies and engage on ethical issues.



History and background

- The Boland Community Research Advisory Board (BR-CAB)
 was established in 2008 and is in its third term of existence.
- During 2014 we have established a Youth CAB which forms part of the Boland Research Community Advisory Board.
- We followed the following process in establishing the CAB:





Relationships



- The CAB participates in various networks and structures:
 - Local Health Network e.g District Health Council, MSAT.
 - International network such as Aids Clinical Trial Group.
- The CAB has a vibrant relationship with the South African Tuberculosis Vaccine Initiative and would like to invite other clinical research groups to share their research with the CAB.
- The value of the CAB is that it has created a:-
 - culturally diverse, safe platform and environment to ask questions about research
 - Platform for researchers to giver feedback on clinical research.

Best Practice Notes for well functioning CABS

Out of our experience we have learnt that the recipe for a well functioning CAB is:

- Good Relationships
 - Relationships with other development organisations in the area for example the CAB did a presentation at Boland College, sustained participation in the Cape Winelands District Health Council, the Multi Sectoral Action Team (MSAT) and the Worcester Hospital Facilitators Council.
 - Open, vibrant relationships with clinical research sites and other clinical research networks through UCT's networks.
- Administrative support
 - Administrative support from site with document management, archives.
 - Logistical and financial support with meetings
- Sustained Capacity Development for CAB members
 - Training in Good Clinical Practice Principles and general organisational skills.
 - Participation in networks which provide capacity
