A+ for Kit Vaughan

Congratulations are in order as Prof Kit Vaughan has been reawarded an A-rating by the National Research Foundation.

Prof Vaughan received a letter from the Foundation on 27 January, confirming that he has been placed in the A category at level A2, and that the rating is valid until the end of 2014.

The A category is defined by the Foundation as: "Researchers who are unequivocally recognized by their peers as leading international scholars in their field for the high quality and impact of their recent research outputs."

Health and human rights training



In January, the Health and Human Rights Programme in the School of Public Health and Family Medicine hosted its 10th annual Train-the-Trainer course in Health and Human Rights.

Convenor, Prof Leslie London, explains: "The course targets teaching staff who train health professionals, to assist them in introducing human rights into their own teaching curricula. This year, there were 16 participants from universities in South Africa (including UCT, and the Universities of Stellenbosch and

the Western Cape), from local NGOs and from other African countries; including Zimbabwe, Burundi, Botswana, Swaziland and Cameroon."

Since the inception of the Train-the-Trainer programme in 1998, more than 200 participants have been trained; and this critical mass has contributed to the Health Professions Council of South Africa's extension of graduate competencies to include human rights and has also contributed to building partnerships across Africa through affiliates of the

International Federation of Health and Human Rights Organizations (IFHHRO). The organization has sponsored the participation of five delegates from several African countries this year.

"The course is unique in providing post-secondary educators with the knowledge, skills, material and educational support to integrate human rights into health professional training in both formal and informal ways," he added.

The programme is scheduled to run again in the first half of 2010.

DEAN'S CORNER

One of the major projects currently underway is the Namibia Heart Project; at its core, the establishment of a cardiology unit in Namibia.

It is impossible to analyse our outreach in Africa without considering the situation in Zim-

babwe. This week, the VC issued a statement to the media, condemning Robert Mugabe and his government for the state of health structures in the country and calling for his government to allow international non-governmental organizations immediate access to alleviate the suffering of the people of Zimbabwe. As a Faculty, we add our voices to this appeal.

Back within our borders, indeed within our walls, there is a strong focus on leadership within the Faculty in 2009; more specifically developing and nurturing this pivotal aspect of our business.

Publication of the Month

Our Faculty is challenged to engage with issues surrounding global health, which is the focus of this month's featured publication.

Macfarlane SB, Jacobs M, Kaaya EE (2008) "In the name of global health: trends in academic institutions", Journal of Public Health Policy, 29: 383-401.

Marian and her colleagues, Sarah Macfarlane from San Francisco and Ephata Kaaya from Dar es Salaam, describe the accelerating development of programmes in global health, particularly in North American academic



institutions, and set this phenomenon in the context of earlier programmes in tropical medicine and international health that originated in

Europe. If global health is about the improvement of health worldwide, the reduction of disparities, and protection of societies against global threats, it is essential that academic institutions reach across geographic, cultural, economic, gender and linguistic boundaries to develop mutual understanding of the scope of global health.

One indication of success would be the emergence of a new generation of truly global leaders working on a shared and well-defined agenda – and doing so on an equal footing.

The Faculty of Health Sciences rounded off a good year with another impressive crop of PhD's at the December graduation ceremony.

Plastic surgery PhD student on a winning streak

Dr Nick Kairinos, a UCT PhD student and registrar in plastic surgery at Groote Schuur Hospital (GSH), has added four more medals to his growing bag of honours.

Just recently he has won the Stratmed Prize for Best Research Paper from the South African Society for Surgery of the Hand, and the Best Scientific Research Paper and also the Best Invention Award, both from the Association of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgeons of Southern Africa. The latter was awarded for his concept on a tissue pressure regulating system to enhance nega-

tive pressure wound therapy.

Kairinos was also a warded third prize at the UCT Surgical Research Day. For Kairinos, a registrar in the Department of Plastic and Reconstructive Surgery, winning has become a habit. He has won prizes every year since joining GSH in 2005, totalling eight national and three local awards.

His current research has resulted in the concept of a new type of vacuum dressing, which regulates its own suction pressure so that wound pressures are always optimal for healing.

As a successful inventor, UCT Research Contracts and IP Services (RCIPS) have filed two provisional patent applications covering Kairinos' inventions.
