# UCT'S INVOLVEMENT IN GENETIC COUNSELLING COMMITTEES NATIONALLY AND INTERNATIONALLY

- In 2004, Jacquie Greenberg was invited to join leaders in the Genetic Counselling profession from the USA, UK, Australia and Japan, who share an interest in genetic counselling education worldwide.
- Pat Craig, Ronnie Smart and Jacquie Greenberg attended the Southern African Society for Human Genetics (SASHG) Symposium at Faculty of Health Sciences, University of the Free State, Bloemfontein (15-16<sup>th</sup> June 2004) and gave a workshop on: The appropriate and ethical use of diagnostic genetic testing. Pat Craig and Jacquie Greenberg each did oral presentations related to genetic counselling.
- At this meeting, a working group was established to address the issues of genetic counselling in Southern Africa and **Pat Craig** was elected as the chairperson. She was then the HPCSA genetic counselling representative on the Medical Science Committee (elected for a 5 years term of office).
- At the Manchester meeting in 2006, which was attended by 72 delegates from 15 countries, the Transnational Alliance for Genetic Counsellors (TAGC) was formed. Jacquie Greenberg was elected onto the Standing committee.
- In 2007, Genetic Counsellors met as a body in South Africa for the first time in Stellenbosch at the 13<sup>th</sup> congress of the South African Society of Human Genetics (SASHG), under the leadership of **Jennifer Kromberg**.
- The TAGC committee met again in Barcelona in 2008 to develop the TAGC mission and vision. At this meeting **Jacquie Greenberg** was elected to represent South Africa on the steering committee of TAGC.
- At the Joint Congress of the SASHG and Africa Society for Human Genetics in Cape Town 2011, Tina-Marié Wessels was elected as the new Chair and Mardelle Schoeman as the Genetic Counsellor's representative on the HPCSA.
- In 2011 UCT was reaccredited for Genetic Counselling internship training by the HPCSA for the next 5 year cycle.
- As of 2012, South Africa, the United Kingdom and Australia have a reciprocity agreement which was initiated by the TAGC after their last meeting in Montreal in 2011, attended by Tina-Marié Wessels and Jacquie Greenberg. This means that genetic counsellors from these 3 countries can work and register in any of the other countries by completing a "shortened internship" involving 6 months working experience, submission of an essay comparing the two health systems, and three references. • In 2012, Jacquie Greenberg stepped down as the South African representative on the Board of the TAGC (she had held this position since 2006), and was replaced by Tina-Marié Wessels.

# UCT'S MASTERS (MSC) IN GENETIC COUNSELLING

# 2004

- UCT began offering a Masters in Genetic Counselling by coursework and dissertation.
- Two students, Frieda Basson (now Loubser) and Brenda Kruger enrolled for the course in 2004 and were the first genetic counsellors to take the oath at UCT (and in South Africa)
- The first two genetic counsellor interns were registered at UCT (first for South Africa): **Raj Ramesar** and **Elise Peterson**. Our UCT experiential internship training course was officially accepted by the HPCSA in 2004.
- A medical genetics module was run as part of our MSc course which involved the training of the first two registered medical geneticists at UCT: Drs **Rik de Decker** and **Karen Fieggen** qualified as geneticists in the subspecialty medical genetics in 2004.

# 2005

- The first two UCT registered genetic counselling students graduated in 2005: Frieda Basson and Brenda Kruger.
- Frieda Basson/Loubser was appointed to the first genetic counselling intern post at the NHLS/GSH
- Three more students enrolled in the genetic counselling course: Kelly Loggenberg, Gabrielle Solomon and Awelani Mutshembele.

#### 2006

- Kelly Loggenberg graduated with an MSc in Genetic Counselling
- Two further students were registered for the course: Zandre Bruwer and Mardelle Schoeman

#### 2007

- Frieda Basson/Loubser was appointed the first genetic counselling post at GSH/NHLS.
- Mardelle Schoeman and Zandre Bruwer (now Laing) graduated with an MSc in Genetic Counselling.

#### 2008/2009

- Gabrielle Solomon graduated, with distinction, with a converted research Masters.
- In 2008/2009 the course was informally reviewed and in July of 2009 Chanel Lewis and Chantelle Scott enrolled for the course.
- Raj Ramesar was registered as a Genetic Counsellor with the HPCSA in 2009

#### <u>2010</u>

• Two students enrolled for the course in 2010: Nakita Verkijk (now Laing) and Vanessa Thomas.

#### <u>2011</u>

- Chantelle Scott graduated with a MSc in Genetic Counselling in June 2011
- Nakita Verkijk/Laing graduated, with distinction, with a MSc in genetic counselling.
- Zandre Bruwer/Laing graduated with a PhD, the first South African qualified, HPCSA registered Genetic Counsellor to graduate with a PhD on a genetic counselling related topic from UCT and possibly the first in South Africa.
- 2011 saw the loss of the only part-time post for a Genetic Counsellor at UCT (National Health Laboratory Services funded for the past 5 years) as well as the only Genetic Counselling Intern training post at UCT: both due to lack of funding.
- Half of the posts at the University of Witwatersrand (Wits/NHLS) were also cut.

# 2012/2013

- Training programmes were suspended at both UCT and Wits in 2012 and 2013.
- During this time, major efforts were made to secure substantive posts for Genetic Counsellors throughout the Western Cape.
- In July/August 2012, 3 elective students (on rotation), Laurence Baret from The Hospital for Sick Children, University of Toronto and Stephanie Goettl and Emily Sandberg from the University of Minnesota, USA, visited Cape Town to observe genetic counselling in South Africa. They spent 6 weeks at UCT in our training unit.
- Ten occasional students registered in June-December 2013 for the first semester course entitled: Principles of Genetic Counselling; Coursework.

# <u>2014</u>

- The UCT training programme was reopened in 2014 and three students were enrolled for the MSc in Genetic Counselling; **Gill Dusterwald**, **Tarryn Shaw** and **Katryn Forie**. They are currently in the process of completing their first year of the course.
- UCT appointed the first HPCSA registered Genetic Counsellor with a PhD degree in Genetic Counselling as a Senior Lecturer in the Department of Clinical Laboratory Sciences; Division of Human Genetics: Dr Tina-Marié Wessels.
- PAWC appointed the first HPCSA Genetic Counsellor at GSH: Nakita Laing.
- A total of 14 health care professionals registered for the four semester courses in 2014.

To date: 14 registered for the course since 2004: 7 qualified and are practising Genetic Counsellors, including one individual who originally registered for the programme, converted to a full research MSc (thesis only), 1 moved to UK, 1 to Australia and 1 to Oman, while 4 remained in South Africa. Three are still in training.
